History: Sally and Forrest Hoglund created The Hoglund Foundation in 1989 as a way to help others and give back to the Dallas and Houston communities. Since its inception, the Foundation has grown dramatically, and has contributed more than \$52 million in funding to more than 554 agencies.

Mission: To improve the lives of at-risk children and families in the City of Dallas, Texas by partnering with organizations that provide education and family support services.

Primary Focus: To make a positive and measurable impact in the community. We favor programs that nurture, recognize and reward individual and family initiative and responsibility. Creative problem-solving and collaboration are encouraged.

Education:

- To deliver systemic improvement through cost effective and scalable initiatives that focus on data-driven results.
- To enhance the learning process of individuals through classroom and teacher support.

Family Support Services:

- To help families remain intact whenever possible by providing resources and training to promote family stability.
- To support the developmental and emotional needs of children with an emphasis on child abuse prevention.

2017 New Partners:

GEM – Girls Embracing Mothers (GEM) helps to empower girls in grades K-12 with mothers in prison to break the cycle of incarceration and lead successful lives. GEM achieves this goal through two programs. The Pearl program helps keep the mother-daughter relationship strong with enhanced visitation sessions based on their Breaking the Cycle-Building the Bond theme. Often times these young girls would not even be able to visit their mom due to the time involved and transportation issues. The Diamond program equips girls with the skills to make positive life choices despite their circumstances.

TEGAC works primarily to fill data holes related to critical public education issues by providing objective, high quality data to Texas policymakers. 2017 Grant Highlights:

Promise House – Promise House envisions every youth having a safe and nurturing place to call home. Their mission is to move youth in crisis towards safety and success. They accomplish this through their emergency and long term housing, case management, educational services, outreach, parenting teen services and advocacy. Every year more than 1700 runaway and homeless youth and their families have an open door 24 hours a day/ 365 days a year at Promise House and receive the crisis intervention they need. Teaching Trust – Teaching Trust develops and supports effective school leaders, at all levels, to build leadership capacity in schools. They believe school leadership is the most impactful lever to improving public education. Through their programming, Teaching Trust empowers educators to expand their influence on campuses, works with campus leadership teams to create aspirational school cultures and prepares future school leaders to thrive in complex urban schools. CitySquare TRAC – CitySquare’s Transition Resource Action Center (TRAC) connects young people, ages 16-24 that are transitioning from foster or substitute care to self-sufficiency, with individual support and access to services. TRAC offers PAL life skills training, workforce services, housing solutions, aftercare case management and additional Texas benefits and services. Through TRAC, Dallas youth leaving state care can find solutions to the barriers they face as they prepare for independent living. Over 800 young adults are served annually and often times TRAC is the only safety net available. www.citysquare.org
